School Year 2023

Western Grammar School (WGS) has grown significantly since its inception as a small primary school, expanding to encompass both primary and secondary education. In 2023, the school achieved notable success, particularly with its Higher School Certificate (HSC) students. The students achieved 17 band sixes and 32 Band fives. This accomplishment underscores WGS's strong academic standards and effective educational programs.

The high percentage of Band 6 achievers reflects not only individual student successes but also the school's overall commitment to academic excellence. This commitment is evident in its rigorous academic preparation and comprehensive support provided from Kindergarten through Year 12. Such achievements surpass community expectations, positioning WGS as a leading educational institution renowned for nurturing and challenging students to reach their academic potential.

This success is likely to enhance WGS's reputation, attracting families who value academic excellence and supportive learning environments. It also demonstrates the school's role in equipping students with the skills necessary for future academic and professional endeavours.

In 2023, WGS achieved significant milestones in its infrastructure development. Stage 3 of the master plan commenced and is scheduled for completion by mid-2024. Additionally, Stage 4, which includes the construction of an underground carpark, and stage 5, the construction of classrooms and a multipurpose hall has been initiated and will commence in 2024.

This expansion is crucial for meeting the growing needs of our students and the community, aligning with WGS's commitment to purpose-built infrastructure for both present and future requirements.

Despite having a smaller student body, WGS achieved financial viability in 2023 without any losses or setbacks. Meeting financial targets was a key accomplishment, enabling substantial investments in infrastructure development. Moreover, the school continued to prioritize financial assistance for student welfare, wellbeing, and educational programs.

Throughout the year, WGS maintained a robust program of professional development and training to elevate teaching standards and skills, ensuring the pursuit of academic objectives. Overall, WGS is steadfastly advancing toward its goals of growth and enhanced educational facilities, supported by sound financial management and a commitment to academic excellence and student welfare. In synopsis, WGS's evolution from a small primary school to a comprehensive K-12 institution accentuates its unwavering commitment to educational excellence and its positive impact on the community.

Academic Performance – 2023

NAPLAN - 2023

In 2023, NAPLAN results were categorized based on proficiency standards, replacing previous numerical bands and national minimum standards. Results for each student were assessed across five domains: numeracy, reading, writing, spelling, and grammar and punctuation. WGS (presumably an educational institution or system) demonstrated consistent growth in these proficiency standards.

WGS focused on early identification of literacy and numeracy gaps through Progressive Assessment Tests. Initiatives such as Get Reading Right (Kindergarten to Year 2), Reading Eggs (for primary school literacy), engagement in the Premier Reading Challenge, and support from a dedicated Learning Support Department aimed to improve these standards. Student achievements were reported against four proficiency levels: Exceeding, Strong, Developing, and Needs Additional Support.

The following table illustrates the distribution of students across these proficiency levels in each assessment area.




The graph below displays the 2023 overall NAPLAN results for years 3,5,7 & 9.


Below are the graphs depicting the 2023 results of students from Kindergarten to Year 10 in Mathematics and Reading:

Other Internal Assessment Programs

The school has several internal assessment programs such as half-yearly exams, assignments, projects, and yearly examinations to monitor student performance to improve their academic level. WGS also use multiple competitions and challenges to improve the academic level of the students. It is school's policy to provide maximum support to improve the academic level and standards of the students. The school senior staff regularly monitor students individual study plans.

High School Certificate (HSC)

The Year 2023 was a very successful year for our HSC students, this year our school came on 110 on the national ranking. Seventeen band sixes and 32 band fives were achieved. The table below provides an overview and analysis of the 2023 HSC results. The WGS staff and management are proud of the accomplishments of our Year 12 students, all of whom are enrolled in University courses. 64.23% of our students marked between 70% to 100% marks, 35.78% students achieved 50 – 70%. As per the below table all student passed their HSC exams.

Numeracy and Literacy Strategies

At WGS we believe that it is essential to focus on literacy and numeracy programs for the success of students' academic achievements and long-term career goals. The school has a highly developed literacy and numeracy approach included in our teaching programs. We have multiple activities including learning support classes, to assist students with English as a second language. WGS has an established learning support department that provides opportunities and comprehensible frameworks to support students throughout their schooling time at WGS starting from Kindergarten.

Our school is dedicated to providing rich, engaging and relevant literacy experiences to enhance the knowledge of our students and develop their learning ability. Programs such as Get Reading Right, phonics and decodable readers were acquired during 2023 to enhance the literacy of our students. The students also participated in many enjoyable literacy-based activities including write a book in a day, writing competitions, debating competitions, book week, Premier Reading Challenge, and National Literacy Week. These events are highly promoted in the school to encourage our students to develop and appreciate a love for reading and students are rewarded for using their creativity and imagination in their writing. Literacy is the single most important part of education. Without literacy, all other learning is impossible. Without the core skills of literacy and numeracy, learning in all other key domains will be a struggle.

Additionally, we recognise that numeracy, like literacy, is a crucial pillar of learning and crucial component of our school curriculum. We strongly believe numeracy is about students having the confidence to choose and use mathematics skills they learn at school in their everyday lives.

During 2023, the school purchased more IT equipment and software to enhance student's computer related skills. The school library has 35 computers, 45 iPad, 14 laptops, 14 chrome books and 6 tablets for primary and high school teachers to utilise to develop students understanding of the digital education. Get Reading Right, Prime Maths and Reading Eggs were the major software programs used for the improvement of literacy and numeracy level in primary school during 2023. Most diagnostic tests and NAPLAN were conducted on the online platform with great success.

Technology Supported Learning

At Western Grammar, we implement alternative methods of teaching to ensure Information and Communication Technologies (ICT) is thoroughly implemented into various lessons. Learning today demands new pedagogical and technological approaches to using ICT. School approach is to prepare students for the demands of rapidly evolving global market by facilitating learning in a technology-rich environment where students and teachers develop understanding about powerful learning and teaching.

Technology and computers have become an integral part of education. The school has short term and long-term plan to continuously improve its ICT infrastructure and facilities. The school currently has fully equipped computer labs for all students and conduct a robotics program for K-6 classes.

Almost every general-purpose learning area is fully equipped with projectors and AV system. IT resources and facilities were provided for the teaching and learning of all KLAs. IT network, computers, devices, and Internet access are closely maintained by our IT department. They also provide all users with the support they may require. For HSC student's laptops and chrome books were provided under supervision to complete their tasks and assignments during their formal and informal assessments. Having regular access to a personal computer at school was essential for their progress. Therefore, school equipped HSC students with IT equipment and services during school hours.

However, WGS senior staff and teachers are fully aware about the adverse effect and disadvantages related to the misuse of technology and social media. In order to address these issues and concerns close monitoring and supervision of students were arranged and senior staff ensured that the students have safe and supportive environment for their learning.

Student Enrolments

In 2023 we again received a large number of enrolment applications for entry in 2024. In December 2023 we had at least 800 students in the waiting list across K-10. Unfortunately, due to the very limited available spaces only handful number of students were enrolled and priority was given to the siblings of existing school students. The large number of applicants on the waiting list is a clear indication of the rapidly growing image of the school in local community. Therefore, it is clearly foreseeable that further growth and development of facilities is imminently and urgently required.

WGS enrolments are governed by the school's enrolment policy. This policy is available on the school website. Parents wishing to enrol their child at Western Grammar School are required to complete an enrolment form and pay an application fee. The parent/guardian of the child must undertake to meet their financial responsibilities for the ongoing enrolment. They should also advise the school admin staff of any standing court order or issues that may impact the

learning of their children. Identification documents and documents of custody, if applicable, must be attached with the enrolment application.

Procedure for Enrolment

The parents/guardians of students must properly fill out the admission application form, application forms must be accompanied by the following supporting documents:

- Birth certificate/Citizenship documentation
- Immunisation records
- Information regarding any allergies/medical conditions
- Information regarding asthma and/or anaphylaxis and supporting action plans
- Two recent school reports (if applicable)
- NAPLAN results (if applicable)
- Information relating to any special needs, diagnosed disabilities, or gifted/talented
- Relevant court orders (if applicable)

When the completed application form and fees are received, the admin will notify the parents/guardians of a date when their child will require to sit an entrance exam for the assessment of students' entry level. After the exam and interviews, the assistant principal and deputy principal or Principal's delegate oversees the procedure of due diligence and prepares a report for the Principal for approval of admission. Senior staff reviews the student's performance along with academic and behavioral records from previous schools. After the due diligence process student is accepted, and the Admin Manager issues an admission offer letter specifying the conditions of enrolment. The admission is completed once the admission offer is signed and returned along with payment of term 1 and building fees in advance.

Withdrawal of Enrolment: A withdrawal form has to be filled if a parent wishes to withdraw their student. The school may review the student's enrolment and may suspend or expel any student under special circumstances. Parents are required to read all relevant policies including the school enrolment policies before signing any documents.

Student Attendance

WGS monitors student attendance responsibly and diligently. Late arrivals need to report to the office to fill in late notes to explain the reason for coming late to school. This procedure is adopted to monitor student's late arrival which gives the school an opportunity to address these issues of punctuality or attendance. Every necessary step is taken to ensure that our students are punctual in their attendance.

Parents/Guardians of students need to explain the reason for the absence of their child if he/she is away from school regularly. WGS has embraced this methodology to guarantee that students are protected and their non-appearance from the school is explained and justified. Communication with parents/ guardians has proven to be an exceptionally successful method for monitoring student's attendance.

Parents of students who are absent from school are contacted daily to find out the reasons for their absence. WGS has adopted this procedure to ensure the safety of the students and their absence from the school is justified. Contact with parents has proven to be a very effective way of maintaining the attendance of students. Medical certificates are required when students are away for extended periods due to health issues. Western Grammar School's attendance policy is available on our school website.

Parents/ guardians of students who wish to apply for long leave for reasons other than sick leave are asked to fill a carer leave form and provide the reasons for non-attendance from school. The parent/carer should apply for leave ahead of time and leave is subject to approval by the Principal. It is advisable that parents must not make travel arrangements prior to the consent of leave approved by the Principal. It is also recommended that parents/guardians should limit their children's absence from school and plan holidays in school breaks as this could impact students' learning and academic performance. Extended sick leave and unexplained nonappearances will be informed to the school liaison officer. Student records will be kept for a period of 7 years. The school can deregister students due to their unexplained and unreasonable absence from the school.

Note: The overall attendance of the WGS students has improved as compared to the attendance record of 2022 with most classes marking attendance above 85%. The table above gives a clear picture of the student attendance in Semester 1 and Term 3, 2023. According to the 2023 DESE attendance data collection Western Grammar School has an overall average for Year 1-10 student attendance as 90.60%.

Outline of Key Policies

Western Grammar School aims to provide education for children in a safe, supportive and nurturing environment. The School will teach the NESA curriculum and Islamic Studies subjects to cater for the needs of enrolled students. Parents and students are expected to support the values and ethos of the school.

Enrolment Policy

As per school enrolment policy the sibling of the WGS existing students will have the first priority for admission in the school subject to the fulfilment of enrolment criteria and available vacancies. Students who are offered position and enrolled are required to adhere and comply with all school rules, policies and procedures to maintain their enrolment.

Welfare

Western Grammar School has an established department dedicated to the well-being of students. We believe that to achieve better academic results, student well-being and welfare are foundational requirements. In addition to legislative requirements, it is part of the school objectives to provide a safe and supportive environment based on the welfare and well-being of the students. To achieve this, the school has policies, procedures, and programs in place. The school board and senior management fully understand the importance of student safety and welfare, which goes beyond academic performance to include the physical, spiritual, emotional, and psychological well-being of students.

To support the students, several welfare and wellbeing events and programs were organized in 2022. These included Sun Safety Week, Harmony Week, a disability services centre excursion by Year 10 students, Anti-Bullying Week, and a Year 6/10 Peer Support Program. These events helped students develop important values of respect, compassion, kindness, and belonging. Students also had the opportunity to raise money for charity as well as for a local women's refuge. The welfare team continued to support students from disadvantaged families by providing uniforms, textbooks, groceries, and transport assistance. WGS also supported

orphans overseas through the Human Appeal orphan sponsorship program, raised money for the Pakistan flood victims, and conducted a Ramadan food drive.

In 2023, the school counselor and a new psychologist continued to assist students with techniques and strategies to manage challenges such as unhappiness, anxiety, academic decline, and social skills. Students have greatly benefited from their continuous efforts in helping with anger management, disruptive behavior, aggression, study-focusing issues, bullying, anxiety, stress, and family issues.

The pastoral counseling service is ongoing, with the school's religious studies staff allocated time to assist students using a spiritual healing framework. Mental health and well-being continued to be a major focus of the welfare team. Many students have benefitted from our pastoral counsellors throughout 2023. All sessions are recorded on Sentral, our school software.

The following are also part of our welfare program run in 2023:

Anti-Bullying Program: Encouraging students to help and support their peers.

The WGS Breakfast Club – The Well-Being team provides breakfast for students every Monday, Wednesday and Friday. This initiative was well received by students. It is run in conjunction with the WGS SRC and the Year 12 students.

Parenting Program - All programs are organised to enhance the understanding of parents regarding parenting. We market the event via email, Skool Loop, Class Dojo, text message and on google classrooms.

Child Protection

The safety, protection and well-being of all students is of fundamental importance to Western Grammar. The School has a range of different obligations relating to the safety, protection and welfare of students including:

- a. A duty of care to ensure that reasonable steps are taken to prevent harm to students;
- b. Obligations under Child Protection Legislation; and
- c. Obligations under Work Health and Safety Legislation.

The purpose of WGS' Child Protection Policy is to outline the obligations imposed by Child Protection Legislation on the School and staff, contractors and volunteers and to provide guidelines as to how the School will deal with child protection matters.

Key Legislation

In March 2020 legislative changes were made to Child Protection. WGS undertook a review of its policy and incorporated the changes in a new policy which was issued in August 2020. The new policy is available on the school's website at <u>www.wgs.nsw.edu.au</u>.

There are four key parts of child protection legislation in New South Wales:

- the Children and Young Persons (Care and Protection) Act 1998 ("Care and Protection Act");
- the Child Protection (Working with Children) Act 2012 ("WWC Act");
- the Children's Guardian Act 2019 ("Children's Guardian Act")
- the Crimes Act 1990 ("Crimes Act").

Anti-Bullying

Western Grammar School's anti-bullying policy and procedures are underpinned by the Islamic values of individual respect and the celebration of diversity. The school has a comprehensive approach of dealing with all forms of bullying. The policy is directed at both preventing bullying from occurring with a multifaceted, whole-of-school approach and responding effectively to incidents of bullying.

The school aims to promote a wholesome culture where the reporting of bullying is encouraged. The school is committed to a process that seriously and sensitively responds to reports of bullying and provides procedures where the victim is cared for holistically and the perpetrator's misbehaviour is managed positively. The anti-bullying plan for 2022 included ongoing preventative strategies focussing on positive behaviours such as respect, safety and kindness. Appropriate and consistent disciplinary measures were adopted for the care and compassion of the student. Anti-Bullying week was conducted in March 2023 for the awareness related to the issues bullying and damaging and harmful impact of bullying on the students.

Complaints and Grievance Policy

Western Grammar's Complaints and Grievance Policy aims to provide clear, positive and procedural fairness that allows grievances to be aired and resolved in a timely and effective manner. This policy is being implemented with positive, clear and effective processes for resolving grievances that may occur in the school, with staff, students and community members. This policy and procedure assist in building strong relationships, reducing anxiety, and ultimately providing students with an enhanced educational environment.

Discipline and Behaviour Management

Western Grammar School's behaviour management philosophy is based on a supportive and preventative discipline model. The school's behaviour management philosophy is not limited to shaping student actions, rather it aims to shaping attitudes to develop intrinsic characteristics like self-respect, self-discipline and God-consciousness. At WGS every effort is made to manage positive behaviour of students. We offer support in terms of one-on-one sessions to see how we may overcome the issues students are facing. Managing disruptive, disorderly and problematic behaviour by some students is one of the challenges faced by teachers and the school management. It is therefore imperative that staff are trained and equipped to effectively manage student behaviour. WGS management regularly organises professional development sessions on behaviour management for staff. The School Rules for students were reviewed and amended in 2020. Student Awards

At Western Grammar School awards are given to students in recognition of their learning effort, academic achievement, creativity, leadership demonstrated, school sport representation, participation in community service activities, and excellence in conduct and attitude. The presentation of awards provides the school community an opportunity to acknowledge the achievements of the students and to celebrate their achievements with them. Through school awards and scholarship policy, WGS hopes to create an environment in which students realise that high standards of effort and achievement in all areas are expected and shall be rewarded. In 2020 the Awards Policy was reviewed and amended to include tuition fee scholarships for DUX awards and cash prizes for outstanding HSC achievements.

Safe and Supportive Environment

Western Grammar School board and management understands the importance of policies and procedures that are required for safe and supportive educational environment. It is the foundation for a successful educational institution and is essential to ensuring students' welfare and academic performance. The school uses positive and motivational measures for behaviour management. The school's Discipline Policy, Award Policy, Student Welfare Policy, Anti-Bullying Policy, Complaint Resolutions Policy, Pastoral Care Policy and various other policies are implemented to manage the behaviour of students and to maintain the school educational environment. The school's management ensures that staff receive first-aid training. Annual mock evacuation and lock-down drills were also conducted in 2023. Bullying, discrimination and anti-social behaviour is not acceptable at Western Grammar School.

Corporal punishment is not allowed at Western Grammar School. The school awards' system is used to motivate the students. Detentions are designed to retain or seize the privileges from students for a short time. Severe measures as suspension and expulsion are only used in exceptional circumstances and as a last option to maintain a safe and supportive educational environment for all students.

Security at WGS is a priority and this is an area where all staff receive continuous training. In 2023 the comprehensive security improvement plan that was initiated in 2019 was continued.

Academic & Extracurricular Activities in 2023

Primary Excursions/ Incursions

Young Leaders Conference

On the 7th of March 2023, our elementary school captains and vice captains attended the Young Leaders Conference at the International Convention Centre in Darling Harbour. The conference provided an opportunity for our students to listen to various speakers on their leadership journeys and learn from their experiences. Some attributes that our students took away were listening skills, being aware of their egos, and knowing their purpose when they choose to lead people. 
The Father and Son Fishing Trip

Children's Behaviour

She beautifully gave us an understanding and appreciation for what our children experience and how that translates in their behaviour. This led to guidance on how parents, with better understanding, can deal with children in a more nurturing and caring way that will develop their self-confidence and overall sense of belonging.



Parent Satisfaction and Feed Back

Parent feedback is invaluable to WGS as it serves as a primary source of information to enhance educational standards and improve student performance. In 2023 measures were taken to actively engage parents in school-organized events and information sessions designed to foster their understanding of their crucial role in their children's academic success.

At WGS, we emphasize the importance of parental feedback and strive to maintain open, constructive, and productive channels of communication. It is essential for parents to prioritize participation and provide well-rounded and fair feedback on school performance and their children's academic and personal development.

WGS offers multiple opportunities for parental involvement, including biannual parent-teacher face-to-face interviews. Our staff is dedicated to comprehending and addressing any concerns raised by parents, ensuring all possible solutions are explored and regular follow-ups are conducted until resolutions are achieved. In 2023, parent-teacher interviews were conducted over 2 days with approximately 95% of parents actively participating. Their feedback was positive, reflecting a high level of satisfaction and providing valuable insights into their perceptions of WGS staff's teaching and learning methods.

In addition to formal interviews, various events and functions, including parent information sessions and parent teacher meet and greet were integral parts of our 2023 activities. These initiatives aim to strengthen the partnership between parents and the school community, ultimately supporting the holistic development and success of our students at WGS.

Other channels of communication such as newsletters, admin notes, dairies, emails, text messages, face book and Skool loop were used to display the school performance for the satisfaction of parents. School board and management is extremely gracious and appreciate the support from the community, parents and staff.

Western Grammar Staff standards and Rate of Retention

In 2023, WGS achieved an exceptional staff retention rate of nearly 100%, with no departures throughout the year—a testament to the school's positive and productive working environment. This environment serves as the bedrock for academic excellence, fostering high achievements among students and cultivating a community of dedicated and loyal individuals committed to WGS's mission.

WGS's teaching staff are accredited and endorsed by NESA to deliver the Australian curriculum, with approximately 95% holding Australian qualifications. Nearly 40% of our educators are highly experienced and accredited at the proficiency level. The school maintains rigorous policies and procedures to continually enhance and uphold teaching standards.

Our staff at WGS are not only qualified but also deeply passionate about teaching, supported extensively by senior management. The senior administration, staff, and Principal foster a friendly and task-oriented atmosphere, prioritizing transparency and professionalism in addressing staff concerns and maintaining a positive work environment.

While WGS enjoys a notably high retention rate, occasional staff departures in 2023 were primarily due to personal reasons. The majority of our senior management and staff have been integral members since the school's inception, demonstrating a strong commitment to WGS and its community.

Educational Environment

The educational environment at WGS is highly acclaimed, fostering significant academic improvements among students through a safe, supportive, and stimulating atmosphere.

Bullying is strictly prohibited and promptly addressed, ensuring students have optimal conditions to achieve their academic goals and success.

Since 2020, rigorous teaching standards have been implemented to reinforce student commitment to learning. Instructional methods have been updated to align with contemporary teaching practices, effectively delivering the educational curriculum. WGS prioritizes professional development (PD) and teacher training, with staff attending PD sessions in 2023 to enhance their skills and capabilities. Primary and High School Coordinators collaborate closely with teaching staff to deliver the curriculum in an organized and engaging manner, supported by newly acquired literacy resources for lower primary students.

At WGS, a cooperative and task-oriented environment between students and teachers is cultivated, facilitating dynamic teaching and learning experiences. The school emphasizes adaptable and responsive curricula that cater to diverse educational needs, fostering each student's development into a self-directed and adaptable learner when ready. Continuous monitoring of current educational research ensures WGS provides exceptional learning opportunities.

WGS remains committed to its primary goal of becoming a leading educational institution and a beacon within the local community. The overall learning and teaching environment at Western Grammar School is dynamic, multidimensional, and consistently yields impressive outcomes.

Student Special Needs

WGS supports students with minor learning difficulties such as ADHD and autism through its approach grounded in holistic principles, emphasizing social preparedness for both current and future challenges. While WGS is not specialized in catering to students with severe special needs, it adheres to NSW Curriculum guidelines drawing from the Australian Curriculum and NSW Syllabuses.

To address diverse learning needs, WGS implements individualized educational modules focusing on Literacy, Numeracy, and Personal and Social Capability. The Learning Enhancement Program plays a crucial role, offering a versatile foundation for future educational initiatives and providing significant support to students with special needs. Recognizing varying learning paces, WGS has tailored teaching programs to assist students who require additional time or support, while also challenging those who need enrichment opportunities.

In 2023, WGS intensified its efforts to cater to students with special needs by continuously adjusting educational modules and allocating increased attention and resources to their learning journey.

Staff Training & Professional Development - 2023

WGS places utmost importance on the continuous development and training of its teachers to enable them to perform at their best. Throughout 2023, a comprehensive schedule of professional development (PD) and training initiatives was implemented aimed at enhancing educational standards and skills among the teaching staff. Additional support and opportunities were provided in compliance with NESA requirements for maintaining teaching standards.


Representatives from AIS were invited to conduct sessions ensuring our staff stayed current with evolving trends and new curriculum requirements. WGS organized numerous external and internal PD sessions throughout the year, significantly enhancing teachers' skillsets and teaching abilities. Formal staff PD sessions spanned eight days, complemented by ongoing meetings and various professional development sessions conducted by senior staff during the school year.

WGS also prioritizes the training of board members, particularly in governance, enabling them to effectively oversee school operations and fulfil their responsibilities. All board members took part in the online training to provide guidance to the school management conducive with the changing staff and student needs. All staff and senior HSC students participated in first aid and CPR training to strengthen their knowledge and skills related to safety and welfare within the school environment.


Financial Summary of 2023

The school's revenue in 2023 saw growth primarily driven by increased Commonwealth and State Government grants, along with steady income from fees and other sources. Despite higher employee-related expenses due to a new pay scale, prudent financial management ensured the school maintained financial viability. The school remains committed to enhancing educational outcomes while ensuring fiscal responsibility and sustainability.

Income: In 2023, the school's revenue saw a significant increase due to effective financial planning and increased student enrolment numbers. The primary sources of income included Commonwealth Grants (65%), State Government Grants (20%), fees and other sources (14%), and Learning Support and sports grants (1%).



Expenditures: The graph illustrates the expenditure breakdown for the year 2023: 75% is allocated to employee-related expenses, covering salaries and benefits. Operating expenditures, comprising 20%, include costs such as building and equipment rental, repair and maintenance, office supplies, technology, teaching resources, curriculum development, security and student-related expenses. The remaining 5% is dedicated to capital expenditures, infrastructure planning and development, and depreciation.



Conclusion

In 2023, WGS celebrated another successful year in terms of academics as well as extracurricular activities. School operations continued smoothly, providing an excellent educational environment conducive to student learning. The school's performance consistently meets NESA standards and community expectations. Increasing academic achievements and a growing student body, along with upcoming expansions, highlight the community's recognition and support for the school's educational standards and reputation.

Looking ahead, the school board has set a vision extending beyond 2025. Board leadership is actively involved in developing processes to monitor school success and meet the needs of our students. The Master Plan forms an integral part of the board's vision, with WGS planning to introduce a double stream in lower primary after completing Stage 3. Throughout these developments, WGS maintains its commitment to financial sustainability and aims to enhance educational outcomes while fostering the holistic development of its students.
